Yes. Of course you're right (even if school wasn't set up to segregate, parents were looking for way out of public school system).

Richard Rothstein had a very interesting piece in that AASA journal. Based on searches of urban archives, he documents that what we think of as *de facto* segregation in Northern and Western cities was in most cases essentially *de jure*. That is, suburban housing codes and covenants were often written to stipulate that new homes would not be sold to non-white buyers.

The whole journal issue is quite compelling.
